





Do Mini Zoos have a Place in Theme Parks?

Although mini zoos originate from the concept of regular zoos that are a very common attraction, they do not hold up to the same standards whatsoever. Some people argue that there is no longer a need for any type of zoo. A point often raised is that the educational factor of zoos is now not required with the increase of nature documentaries that are supposedly a better alternative to seeing animals in 'prison'. Arguments such as these are often brought up by those against the idea of animals being kept in confinement with no freedom and becoming depressed. They also disagree with the hypocrisy of zoos that encourage helping and saving animals only for these zoos to enslave the animals to perform for entertainment.

All of these claims, however, are not necessarily true. Zoos play a part in preventing the extinction of some endangered species. They provide optimal conditions for breeding to stabilize certain populations of animals. Dedicated zookeepers take care of all the animals in the zoo. They make sure animals are fed and safe at all times, tending to those with special requirements as well. The same cannot be said for mini zoos in theme parks, however.

Theme parks are loud and chaotic settings with the purpose of entertaining people for profit. A portion of this profit would go toward maintaining all of the rides and various attractions. This would mean not nearly enough money would go into caring for the animals being confined in a mini zoo within the theme park. Without a strong focus on the mini zoo, it would be impossible for the theme park to maintain a mini zoo ethically. Such a place does not even have the capacity to properly house any animals. This leads to animals being trapped in unnatural environments that can cause deterioration of their mental health. Mini zoos in theme parks do not offer the same benefits that a regular zoo would to the animals, thus making it harmful for the animals in a mini zoo.
